## **PROGRAM PERFORMANCE REVIEW**

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#### **1.** Program Mission, Goals and Environment

The Mission of the California State University Fullerton (CSUF) Aging Studies Program is to provide learning, research, and practical opportunities that produce outstanding gerontologists and professionals with expertise in the field of aging and who meet the needs of an aging population. In accordance with this goal, the CSUF Aging Studies Program offers an Undergraduate Aging Studies Minor, a soon -to-be-announced Undergraduate Aging Science Minor, and a Master of Science in Gerontology (MSG). These cross-disciplinary courses of study offer students knowledge, perspectives, and expertise from academia and the field. Both the Aging Studies minor and the MSG require internships and provide students on-site experience, building a strong foundation in applied and theoretical gerontology, with an emphasis on biological, psychological, and social aspects of aging, as well as ethical and cultural considerations of aging.

Our Aging Studies Minor is a 21-unit program suitable for all undergraduate majors, particularly those in anthropology, biology, business, communications, economics, human services, kinesiology, psychology, and sociology. The 21 units include 3 required lower-division units, 9 required upper-division units, 3 required internship units, and 6 upper-division elective units. The minor is designed to be broad and multi-disciplinary and to enhance any student's chosen major of study. Many students who complete the minor apply to the MSG program.

Our Aging Science Minor is a 21-unit program suitable for undergraduate science majors, particularly those in biology, engineering, kinesiology, psychology, public health, and math. The 21-units include 5 classes from the Aging Studies Program as well as two classes from within the student's major. The minor is designed to facilitate entry into either PhD programs focused on aging or medical school with a focus on geriatrics.

Our Masters-level program provides a wide variety of course offerings and research opportunities, and prepares students for leadership positions in program planning, evaluation, education, policy/advocacy, health and healthcare, research, non-profit organizations, and administration. This is an interdisciplinary program that offers students the opportunity to collaborate with faculty from diverse academic disciplines. In addition, our program is flexible and caters to individuals currently in the work force. Our courses are offered late afternoons and evenings, students can take classes either full or part-time, and we offer electives from a number of partnering disciplines such that study plans can be tailored to meet personal career objectives.

Leadership and location of the Aging Studies program have been stable over the past several years, providing momentum and continuity. For most of the past seven years, the Coordinator for the program has been Dr. Laura Zettel-Watson (Prof. of Psychology). Dr. Melanie Horn-Mallers (Prof. of Human Services) stepped in for one academic year as Coordinator when Dr. Zettel-Watson was on sabbatical. Dr. Barbara Cherry (Prof. of Psychology) spent one semester as coordinator while Dr. Zettel-Watson served as chair of the Psychology department. The current Program Coordinator is Dr. Laura Zettel-Watson.

Aging Studies is housed with Environmental Studies in a dedicated suite in the Humanities Building (H424) which creates more visibility as a multi-disciplinary program and provides better access for students and faculty from other departments. The College of Humanities and Social Sciences Dean's office has been very supportive of our program in terms of providing not only this dedicated office space, but also consistent staff support (i.e., 20-hour/week administrative support coordinator Kim Bette), and flexibility in class sizes. Table 1 provides information on the transitions occurring from 2016 to 2023. The past seven years have created a more multidisciplinary focus and central location while continuity has been provided by the continued leadership of Drs. Zettel-Watson, Horn-Mallers, and Cherry, who have been involved in various roles since 2011.

Although the Aging Studies Program is a multi-disciplinary program and serves students from at least five colleges, primary support for the Aging Studies Program is provided by the College of Humanities and Social Sciences. The program also receives more than \$10,000/year from private donors, earmarked to distribute to our students in the form of academic scholarships. We have both a Gerontology Program Council (GPC) and Affiliated Faculty. The GPC consists of approximately 10 faculty (currently from Psychology, Human Services, Anthropology, Public Health, Kinesiology, Counseling, and Economics) who meet at various times throughout the academic year to coordinate the Aging Studies program, serve on committees, and provide handson support and guidance for the program. In an effort to promote faculty participation, service on at least one standing committee (Curriculum and Assessment, Admissions, Awards and Scholarships, Events, or Marketing) is required of all Council Members. The Affiliated Faculty consists of an additional 25 faculty and researchers across campus with an interest in Aging and Gerontological issues.

Society, communities, and current policy are not prepared for the support and services that will be required to accommodate a burgeoning population of older adults. Current statistics (United Nations, 2023) report that in 2021 there were 761 million adults aged 65 years or older worldwide, and that this number will double to 1.6 billion in 2050. In Orange County alone, over 450,000 (14.3%) of the population is 65 years and older. Careers in aging are currently among the top 10 fields for employment and will remain so for the foreseeable future. Interestingly, CSUF is one of the few institutions that offers an MSG to students who live locally or in surrounding counties. The CSUF Aging Studies Program has worked diligently to create a program that can meet this need by incorporating both applied and theoretical coursework that will train future gerontologists and professionals with a variety of age-related skill sets.

The CSUF campus also houses a very active Osher Lifelong Learning Institute (OLLI). The Institute has approximately 1100 members at this time, which allows for a variety of collaborations between OLLI members and the campus community. OLLI members serve as research participants, tutors, panel members and participants in various classroom activities. OLLI elects a member to serve as a liaison for these collaborations, and this individual serves as an ex officio member of our Gerontology Program Council. Figure 1 shows steady increase in OLLI collaborations with CSUF since 2016. Although a very small part of the campus community, Aging Studies Program affiliates represent a sizeable number of these collaborations.


A number of changes have been implemented in the past seven years to increase awareness of aging issues and enhance student learning experiences (see Figure 1). Our Aging and Dementia course (AGNG 420) became a service learning class (Spring, 2018) in order to deliver 5 weeks of student training/experiential learning on site at Alzheimer's Family Services Center, Huntington Beach, CA. The service learning experience provides exposure to various types of dementia, the clinical presentation of dementia, aspects of caregiving, and best practices for behavior management and intervention in dementia patients. Alzheimer's Family Services Center includes didactic trainings and continued learning experiences in the form of case presentations, case studies and group work.

In response to the pandemic, concern grew for older adults in terms of isolation and loneliness. Professor Karen Wong first addressed this in her Introduction to Aging course (AGNG 133; Spring 2020) by having her students pair with older adults (working through organizations such as St. Jude and Project Life) with weekly phone calls to see what older adults needed and to teach them technology to stay linked with their families and friends (Facebook, text, zoom, etc.). This continues to this day as an internship called Project Outreach (AGNG 495) in association with medical, non-profit, and for-profit organizations working for and on behalf of older adults.

To heighten visibility, our program name changed from Gerontology to Aging Studies in Fall 2019. In addition, a new general education course (AGNG 313, California Gold: Aging and Diversity) was developed (Fall, 2020) to highlight issues related to diversity and aging, with California serving as a microcosm for these concerns worldwide. The Association for Gerontology in Higher Education (AGHE) is currently developing an accreditation procedure for academic programs in Gerontology to which we plan to apply. In the meantime, we received designation as one of AGHE's Program of Merit recipients for our Aging Studies Minor (Fall, 2020). The Program of Merit is a voluntary program of evaluation for AGHE member and nonmember institutions that offer either gerontology programs (degree and non-degree granting) and/or health professions programs whose curricula integrates gerontology/geriatrics content. The Program of Merit designation gives gerontology and health professions programs an AGHE "stamp of excellence" that they can use to verify program quality, lobby within their institutions for additional resources to maintain program quality, market the program, and recruit prospective students. Based on the performance of our program and the wide-reaching aging-focused proceedings campus-wide, CSUF received designation as an Age-Friendly University, part of the AGHE Global Network, in Spring 2021.

Changes have been made to increase rigor in our graduate program and to enhance graduation rates. AGNG 535 (Program Planning and Evaluation) was added as a required course after feedback from MSG alumni about what they felt would have better prepared them for professional employment in the field (2016). We also now have a one-year culminating research project guided by faculty in fall and spring in the second year of students' programs (beginning Fall 2020). This has improved our graduation rate from 30% to 89.3% over the past few years. These courses teach research methods and how to access and evaluate secondary data (Fall), then how to analyze and report on students' specific research questions with selected data from this secondary source (e.g., MIDAS; Spring). The first course in the sequence is AGNG 593 (Research Methods in Gerontology, Project Development- Capstone I), which focuses on research processes and problems in gerontology, including studies of applied research and program evaluation in the field of gerontology. The second course is AGING 594 (Research Methods in Gerontology, Completion of Project- Capstone II), where students utilize secondary data to explore and analyze an original and individualized research question and complete all chapters of their capstone master's project.

## 2. Program Description and Analysis

Our program includes an Aging Studies minor, a recently created Aging Science minor, and a graduate-level Master of Science in Gerontology. Additional classes have been added to meet minor requirements and we have been able to reinstate a fundamental partner class that had not

been taught for a number of years (i.e., BIOL 306 - Biology of Aging). Our Aging Studies minor

requirement is 21 units (7 classes) of which 9 units (3 classes) can overlap with the student's

major. Our Aging Science minor requirement is 21 units (5 aging science classes) and two classes

from each student's home department. The Master of Science in Gerontology is a 30-unit program

with seven core classes and three electives (across disciplines). Current course offerings include

the following.

## **The Aging Science Minor**

The Aging Science minor provides both theoretical and applied foundations in the science of aging. The minor trains STEM majors to integrate cutting-edge aging knowledge into their respective fields and teaches students to think critically about the implications of their work for aging populations in the United States as well as globally. The population is rapidly aging worldwide; however, there is a shortage of specialists prepared to address the needs of aging societies. As a complement to any STEM degree, the Aging Science minor enhances the competitiveness of STEM students applying to graduate or medical school. The minor is 21 units over two years. Students take 15 units in the Aging Core (below) and 6 aging-related elective units in their major department to complete the minor.

Our program has several challenges at the present time. Our recruitment of new students has dropped in the past few years despite an increase in recruiting efforts. This may in part be due to a relatively new CSUF graduate program in Social Work, which now offers an aging track. In addition, a dramatic drop in University enrollment, especially for small programs such as ours, occurred both during and post pandemic. Recruitment efforts have included presentations about our program to existing classes across our campus and community colleges, and campus-wide events such as Geropalooza and Careers in Aging. The former is an annual aging-related fair in the central quad with games, activities, food and prizes. The latter is a career and internship fair with a speaker series and community partner booths. We are currently exploring podcasts to expand our reach to students. We have also developed a course (to be offered beginning Fall 2024), which meets the University's upper-division writing requirement (AGNG 363, Advanced Writing with a Focus on Aging). This should expose more students to issues related to aging.

## **3.** Documentation of Student Academic Achievement and Assessment of Student Learning Outcomes

Aging Studies/Gerontology is currently a small field with supportive networking. Perhaps the best indicator of the strength of our program is that our students go on to do incredible work in

leadership positions in the field. For example, graduates of our MSG program hold positions in the following places: Orange County Office on Aging; Orange County Council on Aging; Recreation Supervisor, City of Newport Beach; Director of Senior Services with the LGBTQ Center Orange County; Adjunct Faculty at CSUF in Public Health, Sociology, and Aging Studies; Gerontology Access Program with Orange County Transit Authority; Social Work and Case Management in various cities/counties; and Alzheimer's Orange County.

In terms of assessment, we implemented three student learning outcomes for our Master's students when they were still required to complete a thesis or project. This form was completed by individual faculty serving on thesis or project committees to evaluate the application of gerontological theories, concepts, and issues (Student Learning Outcome 1), written communication skills (Student Learning Outcome 2), and oral communication skills (Student Learning Outcome 3) based on a rating scale of 0 (poor) to 4 (excellent).

#### **SLO 1: Application of Gerontological Theories, Concepts, and Issues** 4. Excellent: Student thoroughly reviewed relevant literature and integrated interdisciplinary knowledge; logically applied literature to research question or inquiry; incorporated strong methodology (and analysis, if applicable); drew several insightful conclusions; included several meaningful implications for the field.

3. Good: Student reviewed the relevant literature and integrated interdisciplinary knowledge, but not as thoroughly as for #4; applied literature to research question or inquiry; incorporated good methodology (and analysis, if applicable); drew a few insightful conclusions; included a few meaningful implications for the field.

2. Acceptable: Student reviewed relevant literature, but with some gaps, and adequately integrated interdisciplinary knowledge; used adequate methodology (and analysis, if applicable); drew a few conclusions; included a few implications for the field, but lacked the insight required for #3 or #4.

1. Deficient: Student conducted a limited literature review and/or seemed to "miss the big picture"; used inadequate methodology (and analysis, if applicable); any conclusions drawn were cursory or did not reflect an entirely accurate understanding of the topic/literature.

0. Poor: Student failed to review and understand the literature; failed to apply interdisciplinary knowledge correctly; used inappropriate methodology (and 14 analysis, if applicable); failed to draw conclusions or implications related to the topic/literature.

## **SLO 2: Written Communication Skills**

4. Excellent: Student's writing was clear, concise and well-organized; demonstrated excellent clarity and grammatical mastery.

3. Good: Student's writing was generally clear and organized; demonstrated good clarity with few grammatical errors.

2. Acceptable: Some sections of the student's writing were unclear and unorganized; demonstrated adequate clarity with several grammatical errors.

1. Deficient: Several sections of the student's writing were unclear and organization was deficient or lacking; demonstrated little clarity with more widespread grammatical errors.

0. Poor: Severe problems with student's writing and organization; significant lack of clarity and serious and numerous grammatical errors impairing reader's understanding.

#### **SLO 3: Oral Communication Skills**

4. Excellent: Student's oral communication was well-organized and eloquent; had excellent audience engagement; provided well-expressed responses; arguments were skillfully presented; advanced knowledge in subject area exhibited.

3. Good: Student's oral communication was organized and articulate; had good audience engagement; provided clear responses; arguments were well presented; strong knowledge in subject area exhibited.

2. Acceptable: Student's oral communication was mostly organized and articulate; had acceptable audience engagement; provided basic responses; arguments were sufficiently presented; adequate knowledge in subject area exhibited.

1. Deficient: Student's oral communication was somewhat disorganized and inarticulate; had low audience engagement; provided inadequate responses; arguments were insufficiently presented; inadequate knowledge in subject area exhibited.

0. Poor: Student's oral communication was mostly disorganized and inarticulate; had unacceptable audience engagement; failed to provide sufficient responses; arguments were poorly presented; very little knowledge in subject area exhibited.

In addition, some of our classes are offered online and student assessment is evaluated in several ways. In our AGNG 133 online class, students are assessed with five quizzes, one exam, six discussion boards which include hands-on activity (e.g., students use materials to accelerate their aging so they can experience limited mobility, etc.), and written assignments. In our AGNG 425 online class, students are assessed with a midterm and final exam, discussion board assignments, confirmation of visits to a shop that sells medical devices, wheel chairs, etc., and presentation of a universal design for their own home or home of a loved one where they can age in place. In our AGNG 595 online class, biweekly discussions are evaluated for duties performed at internship sites and connections to course material. A mid-semester interview paper and end of semester final paper are also assigned.

We have also created an exit survey for Master's students to better assess where our strengths and weaknesses are for the program (see Appendix B).

#### 4. Faculty

Because we are an interdisciplinary academic program rather than a department, home departments for our tenure-track faculty are in other disciplines (e.g., Human Services, Psychology, Public Health, Sociology). The composition of the teaching staff is primarily tenure track faculty or MSG-level Gerontologists teaching our core classes. Part-time faculty include Karen Fazio and Karen Wong (both Gerontologists) and Dr. Cheryl Alvarez, who provides servicelearning opportunities for working with dementia patients. Core 500 level classes are taught primarily by tenure-track faculty (Drs. Zettel-Watson, Horn Mallers, Cherry). Several required 500 level courses have also been taught by part-time faculty (AGNG 500, AGNG 535). Ms. Karen Fazio was contracted to teach these classes due to her expertise in the field as a professional gerontologist. Part-time faculty have also taught 400 level courses (Dr. Urvi Patel, Ms. Karen Wong, Ms. Karen Fazio), see Table 5.

In addition to hiring highly qualified instructors, the Aging Studies program also employs a Graduate Assistant. In an effort to assist our MSG students toward timely graduation, we have chosen to replace an offered elective with a funded graduate assistant. The graduate assistant has served as a tutor and facilitator for our MSG students to use as a resource for study design, data analysis, and writing. This assistant has typically been working with students approximately 15 hours per week.

#### 5. Student Support and Advising

The Aging Studies Program advisor has been Ms. Karen Wong since 2012. Ms. Wong has an MSG from CSUF and currently advises both masters and minor students. Ms. Wong spends approximately 10 to 15 hours a week advising students either by email, phone, or in-person. This constitutes about 15-20 individuals per week and includes undergraduate minors, undergraduate potential minors, undergraduate non-minors with an interest in aging studies but an aging concentration in their own department, graduate students, potential graduate students, applicants, and students from other departments with an interest in interning in the aging field (Sociology, Psychology, Human Services, Public Health, Business, Kinesiology). Each student is assessed based on their individual situation. The student's TDA is reviewed with the student. A study plan is implemented to help the student stay on target with graduation. In addition, if the student has any specific interests (interest in leadership skills, job hunting, or a specific area of gerontology) the meeting will be more in-depth to help the student reach future goals. Students are provided information on the following:

- 1) Scholarships
- 2) Internships
- 3) Specific courses for their particular area of interest
- 4) Study abroad options with an aging focus
- 5) Completing study plans for undergraduate and graduate students
- 6) Information on academic probation

7) GS-700 (Each semester the student adviser will call students registered for GS-700 to check on their progress and prompt them to move toward completion, if necessary.)

8) Internships in Aging studies

9) Goals and timelines set for students registered for GS-700.

Ms.Wong also teaches our internship class. Her outstanding work with students over the

course of the past few years has been recognized at both the College and the University level. She

has been nominated for and/or awarded a variety of honors and achievements:

As a program, we also offer several outreach events for our students. For example, we periodically hold workshops for struggling students. These are aimed at graduate students who have stalled at a particular part of their writing or research. The workshop hosts, compensated with funds from the programs Operations and Expenses budget, address any challenges the students are experiencing and try to partner struggling students together to help each other, facilitated by the graduate assistant, the advisor, and the program coordinators.

Sigma Phi Omega (SPO) is a nationally-based honor society for Aging Studies/Gerontology which is open to both graduate and undergraduate aging studies students. Both Ms. Karen Wong and Dr. Horn-Mallers have served as faculty advisors for our local chapter (https://hss.fullerton.edu/agingstudies//09\_honors/index.aspx). Meetings and events are held throughout the academic year. For example, April is Careers in Aging month and typically SPO hosts an event with gerontologists from the field along with students and faculty. The last SPO event (late Fall 2023) was a panel discussion on Age and LGBTQ issues. This was incredibly successful with approximately 90 participants attending the event.

In addition, we are also very fortunate to have a number of donors who provide scholarships to students conducting research in the field of aging. We hold an awards ceremony in early May to honor scholarship recipients and their sponsors as well as new SPO members. We have approximately 10 scholarships awarded yearly from four sources. These awards range from \$1000-\$1500 per student, per semester.

#### **6.** Resources and Facilities

The Aging Studies Program has traditionally had one "first rights" classroom. Although one classroom should be able to meet the needs of our small program, the small size of the room (UH 240, cap of 27), does not allow us to offer reasonably sized undergraduate/general education sections or electives. When we can offer just 7 courses per semester, we struggle to meet our fulltime equivalent student (FTES) target if we cannot offer larger lower-division courses. Further, we currently only use standard classrooms, but it would be helpful in teaching Aging Studies 593 and 594 (Capstone Courses) to have access to computer classrooms/laboratories.

The CSUF Pollak Library has had dedicated Aging Studies/Gerontology librarians, Joy Lambert, and now Adolfo Prieto (Fall, 2019) to support our students as well as a specific site on the library website that provides additional assistance (Aging Studies Subject Guide at https://libraryguides.fullerton.edu/gerontology). In addition, the library supports the Aging Studies Program and its students by providing a variety of print and online resources. *AgeLine*, the library's main aging-focused database, includes information specifically related to older adults as reflected in fields such as social work, health sciences, sociology, and psychology. As Aging Studies is a multidisciplinary field of study, students and faculty also can find pertinent research in a number of other library databases including *APA PsycInfo*, *PubMed*, *CINAHL*, *Academic Search Premier*, *CQ Researcher*, *Sociological Abstracts*, and *Social Services Abstracts*. Access to over 100 aging-related journals is available through online database subscriptions. The library is also continuously augmenting the Aging Studies collection, which includes books, e-books and audiovisual materials. Books and e-books on aging are actively added each year and are purchased using the library's approval plan and by librarian selections. Any materials students and faculty need outside of the library's immediate collection can be obtained easily through the library's interlibrary loan service.

In May 2022, Dr. Zettel-Watson and Dr. Jennifer Piazza (Public Health) received a \$1.6M Research/Education Training Grant from the National Institutes of Health. The grant supported the creation of the Aging Science Minor and four of its five affiliated courses. The grant also supports research training for the first 18 Aging Science Minors.

#### 7. Long-term Plans

In accordance with the University's mission, goals and strategies, we are diligently working to position our program to better prepare our students to become effective, resourceful, and impactful professionals serving older adults. To this end, we continue to design programs both within and outside the classroom that provide our students with high-impact practices and that link their future careers with the current community needs. We continue to work on maintaining a high profile both within CSUF and beyond to capitalize on interdisciplinary and community research and programs. We need additional financial support to address a few key areas. First and foremost, we need better support for marketing and recruitment of minors and graduate students (more on this below). Per the CSUF census report (2023), Aging Studies minors have dropped from 29 in spring 2019 to 8 in spring 2023. MSG students have dropped from 22 in spring 2020 to 7 in spring 2023 and with 0 enrollment fall 2023 (see Appendix B). Further, we could use funds to increase

our ability to include more high-impact service learning components (on-site facilities) in our curriculum.

It may be helpful to note that faculty who teach and/or coordinate the Aging Studies program are not "housed" in Aging Studies; rather, such faculty are also committed to their home departments, often leading to tremendous work overload. The program has been fortunate that there has been funding to provide course release time each semester for the elected Program Coordinator, who has traditionally provided a release for an assistant coordinator (one release each for coordinator and associate coordinator, per semester). Faculty are in great need, however, of additional support in order to grow the program and meet the needs of an ever-increasing aging population. This could include support for more release time for coordination, website support, research funding to better engage students in aging-related research, and student travel.

Finally, as addressed earlier, marketing and student recruitment are primary goals. To elaborate, our program has a 2.0 FTEF (10 courses/semester), from which the coordinator and associate coordinator course releases are deducted. We have also needed to pay our graduate student assistant from this. This leaves us with funding to offer 7 courses per semester. Three of these are required Aging Studies masters-level courses, which generally have about 10 students/class. In order to meet our FTES target (~120-140 students/semester), we need to offer two sections of AGNG 133 (cross-listing them with partner departments [e.g., PSYC, SOCI, PUBH] for exposure as well as one section of AGNG 313. This results in our inability to offer more than one AGNG elective (graduate or minor) per semester, impeding our service to our undergraduate minors.

We continue to market the program to reduce our reliance on other departments – for Spring 2017, 48% of 133 students enrolled through AGNG sections, as compared to 21% in Fall 2016. Ideally, we will be able to add FTES/FTEF to enable us to offer additional electives. A greater number of electives will enable us to serve a greater number of minors, increasing campuswide exposure and creating a larger pool of potential MSG students.
