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Chair's Preface

During the period since the Psychology Department's last program performance review (PPR) in 2007, the State of California and its public universities have weathered the most serious economic crisis since the Great Depression. These years have tried the morale of faculty, staff and students and challenged the department's ability to carry out its mission of affording a high quality education to a highly diverse student population. The FTEF allocation to the department declined from 42.3 in 2007-2008 to a low of 37.0 in 2009-2010. FTEF have since rebounded and reached new levels: 49.0 in 2011-2012 and 51.0 in 2012-2013. The economic pinch mandated shifting dwindling resources from student support and scholarship to teaching. For example, for a few years, the only assigned time was for the chair and a bare minimum of undergraduate advisement, with no release time even for graduate program coordinators. In addition to cuts in FTEF, the Department's operating budget experienced severe cuts. Operating expense are now only a little more than half of what they were in 2006-2007.

Even though the psychology major was declared by the CSU chancellor's office to be impacted, the size of Psychology's student body has increased dramatically. Already one of the largest departments in the College of Humanities and Social Sciences, the Psychology Department is now the largest in terms of FTEF and majors. Psychology also offers many highly popular classes that meet general education requirements. Throughout the economic downturn, the Psychology Department has been crucial to the college's ability to make FTES target.

Since the last PPR, the number of majors has increased over 26% to 2,143. This figure is nearly double the number of majors in the college's next most populous department, Politics, Administration and Justice. It is also nearly double the number of Psychology majors ten years ago. In fact, the number of students in the Psychology Department exceeds that of many entire colleges at CSUF. Such growth has provided benefits but has also been a challenge, particularly when administrative resources for department staff have not increased. This means the Psychology Department has been doing more while the administrative structure of the department has had to remain constant.

At the time of the last PPR, more than half of the faculty had been hired in the past six years. These younger faculty have been very enthusiastic and highly dedicated to both teaching and scholarship. During the past seven years, they have received tenure and promotion. In fact, this year, the first wave of those hires has applied for promotion to full professor. At the time of the last PPR, Psychology was a very young department. Now, those newer hires are entering the middle years of their careers. The history of the Psychology Department is one in which there have been dramatic pendulum swings between having an older or younger faculty. To try to escape this cycle, the department—even amid dire financial straits—has continued hiring: four new tenure track assistant professors in the last four years. As the faculty ages, the department faces the challenge of finding resources to support their continued scholarship.

One of the major problems cited in the previous PPR was a lack of adequate research space. Since that time, the university funded and carried out the oft-canceled renovation of the 6th floor of the Humanities Building. The entire 6th floor was gutted and rebuilt. This project has been a boon to the university–greatly increasing the number of classroom seats–and to the Department. All faculty members now have clean, functional lab space. Still, as the department seeks to grow, space limitations will continue to be a challenge.

I. Department Mission, Goals and Environment

A. Mission and Goals

1. Bachelor of Arts

Mission. Psychology is a science whose central theme the study of behavior. Psychology studies how we interact with one another and our environment. Psychology is practical; it is concerned with improving the quality of life. Psychologists work in a broad range of research and applied settings. The psychology major is designed to provide each student with a comprehensive overview of the major fields of psychology, the methods used in psychological research, and the applications of psychological knowledge.

The major is also designed to assist the student in selecting elective courses which can form a concentration in an area of each student's interest. These specialty areas might include clinical, social, developmental/child, industrial/organizational, learning/cognitive and biological psychology. The major provides a basis for careers in a variety of psychology related occupations, including mental health agencies, hospitals, teaching, business and public organizations. The major prepares students for graduate training in fields such as clinical psychology, marriage and family therapy, teaching, social work, law, business management, and public administration.

Student Learning Outcomes. All students majoring in psychology shall achieve competence in the following domains:

- 1. Students can identify appropriate basic research methods to test hypotheses empirically.
- 2. Students can apply psychological theory to scientific questions and real-world problems.
- 3. Students can find and evaluate relevant literature.
- 4. Students can demonstrate proficient writing skills, including scientific writing in APA style.
- 5. Students can manage data and analyze data using appropriate statistical methods.
- 6. Students can analyze psychological research and theory in relation to their own personal development.
- 7. Students can identify how diversity impacts individual and social behavior.
- 8. Students can employ appropriate ethical principles in psychological settings.

2. Master of Arts Program

Mission. The Master of Arts (M.A.) program seeks to prepare graduates for Ph.D. work by offering advanced statistical and methodological courses and research experience. The M.A. program prepares students for a variety of careers in industry, education, and mental health. The program also seeks to assist students who are committed to the field of psychology, but are undecided on a specialty, by giving them an opportunity to explore their career options. The program targets two main areas of learning: (a) mastering concepts, terminology and issues relating to psychology; and (b) developing an analytical, scientific perspective on psychology that culminates with a research mentorship experience.

Student Learning Outcomes. All M.A. students shall achieve mastery in the following domains:

A. Concepts and Terminology

- 1. Know the legal and ethical responsibilities related to conducting psychological research and apply these in actual research situations.
- 2. Develop strong critical thinking skills with regard to evaluating psychological research.
- 3. Develop a command of the research in two sub-areas of psychology of the student's choosing.
- 4. Apply a variety of dominant theoretical frameworks for designing research projects and predicting their outcomes.
- 5. Employ statistical knowledge to analyze research data and develop conclusions.
- 6. Be sensitive to the influence of ethnicity and cultural values that might affect or moderate research outcomes.

B. Analytical, Scientific Perspective and Research Mentorship

7. Develop a command of research methodology and statistical techniques and employ these methods and techniques in an original master's thesis of their own design.

3. Master of Science Program

Mission. The Master of Science (M.S.) program seeks to prepare individuals to pursue two different career paths. Most graduates choose to become licensed professional therapists (MFT or LPCC); thus, the program seeks to give them the knowledge and skills they need to be highly effective clinicians. Increasingly, M.S. program graduates have sought to pursue Ph.D. training in clinical, counseling or other areas of psychology. Thus, the program seeks to give them the experiences and training necessary to make them highly competitive applicants for doctoral programs.

The program targets three different areas of learning, essential to both career paths: (a) mastering frameworks, concepts, terminology and techniques relating to clinical psychology; (b) adopting an analytical, scientific perspective on psychology and personal adjustment, including research mentorship experiences; and (c) gaining hands-on experience with actual clinical cases, applying learning from didactic coursework to clients, and receiving intensive supervision, including review of video-recorded sessions.

Student Learning Outcomes. All M.S. students shall achieve mastery in the following domains:

A. Frameworks, Concepts, Terminology and Techniques

- 1. Know the legal and ethical responsibilities related to clinical practice; apply these in actual clinical situations.
- 2. Master the diagnostic and conceptual framework for mental disorders and related terminology; accurately diagnose actual clinical patients.
- 3. Apply a variety of dominant theoretical frameworks for describing personality, predicting behavior, treatment planning and guiding clinical interventions.

- 4. Employ therapeutic techniques from a variety of theoretical models for intervening with children, adolescents and adults in individual, family and group modalities.
- 5. Be familiar with assessment techniques commonly used in clinical practice; understand their administration, scoring and interpretation.
- 6. Be sensitive to the influence of ethnicity and cultural values on clinical practice; consider cultural and ethnic influences while working with therapy cases.

B. Analytical Perspective and Research Mentorship

- 7. Gain command of research methodology and statistical techniques; employ these methods and techniques in an original master's thesis of one's own design.
- 8. View clinical interventions as a hypothesis testing process; assess the effectiveness of one's interventions objectively.

C. Hands-on Experience

9. Complete 280 hours of direct clinical contact during a year-long clinical internship in a professional mental health setting; complete a two-semester Fieldwork sequence.

B. Changes and Trends in the Discipline

The field of psychology increasingly values quantitative sophistication. The department has responded to this demand in two ways: first, three years ago, we hired two tenure-track assistant professors with strong statistical skills. One is a pure quant person, whose expertise is in item response theory. The second has very strong quant skills, combined with a substantive area of research on the effects of culture on personality and behavior. In addition, one of our two newest assistant professors, from our child psychology search, has a very strong quant background. In addition, the field is ever more cognizant of culture as an important influence on people. Two of our four most recent hires explicitly examine culture as a variable in their research.

Both of these trends are reflected in our graduate curriculum. In addition to offering more graduate seminars in quantitative methods through Psyc 520T–Advanced Topics in Psychological Research, the department has recently approved two new graduate level classes: Psyc 515–Meta-analysis and Psyc 516–Structural Equation Modeling. These classes were developed by two of our new hires and are currently passing through the university curriculum approval process. The M.A. program is considering increasing the number of units required for the degree from 30 to 36 and adding a quantitative class requirement.

In the M.S. program, cross-cultural influences have always been important. However, courses have recently added more explicit emphasis on culture: for example, Psyc 547–Theories of Psychological Intervention now directly addresses Western versus Eastern ways of thinking when evaluating theories of personality. Cultural influences on the psychotherapy process are also explicitly dealt with during M.S. students' internship through their Fieldwork classes (Psyc 594A & B).

Online education is another important trend in the field. The department has been offering progressively more of its core courses online, in addition to traditional face-to-face formats. Currently, it is possible for a psychology major to complete more than 50% of his or her classes

online. CSUF Psychology seems well ahead of many other psychology departments at comparable institutions in the variety of online classes offered.

Finally, the psychology of gay, lesbian, bisexual and transgender individuals has become an increasingly important focus. Psychology added a new class: Psyc 456–The Psychological Study of Gay, Lesbian and Bisexual Experiences. The Psychology Department has also been one of the core sponsors of the new multidisciplinary Queer Studies minor at CSUF.

C. Priorities for Future

The department seeks to continue hiring new assistant professors to flatten out the pendulum swings that resulted from previous hiring binges and droughts during prior good and bad economic times.

Since the last PPR, when the department was dominated by untenured faculty, those individuals have become tenured and are beginning to apply for promotion to full professor. Maintaining morale and productivity for senior faculty members—who traditionally have less assigned time and therefore shoulder a greater share of teaching—will increasingly become a priority.

The renovation of the sixth floor greatly enhanced the physical environment for faculty, both for teaching and for scholarship. However, as the department considers growing, space limitations for full-time faculty offices, part-time faculty offices and faculty labs will again become a problem. In addition, with growing numbers of faculty both using computers as part of their classroom instruction and collecting data via computers, the department needs more dedicated computer lab/classroom space. Our current space is consistently used to its limit.

II. Department Description and Analysis

A. Substantial Curricular Changes

The Psychology Department seeks to address significant trends in the field by having a curriculum that is current and forward thinking. Recently, the department voted to make changes in the major. In addition, due to changes in State of California laws regarding training of licensed master's level therapists, the M.S. program has made major modifications.

1. Bachelor of Arts Program

Last year, the department voted to drop Psyc 461–Psychological Testing as a requirement for all majors. After a thorough review of degree requirements at a range of colleges and universities, we determined that CSUF was nearly unique for having the major testing requirement. In conjunction with dropping Psyc 461, the department raised the number of required 300/400 level upper division elective units from 6 to 9. This kept the number of units required for the major the same but allowed students more leeway in deciding which elective classes to take.

In conjunction with this, we have also been adding new 300- and 400-level elective classes to the curriculum. These include: Psyc 325–Psychology of Prejudice and Discrimination, Psyc 421–Psychology of Immigration, Psyc 445–Psychology of Death, Dying and Bereavement, and

Psyc 456–The Psychological Study of Gay, Lesbian and Bisexual Experiences. We have also added provisional classes such as Psyc 452–Psychology of Intimate Relationships and Psyc 471–The Parallel Lives of Dolphins and the Great Apes.

The department has strived to meet the needs of a very diverse population of students by offering a full range of classes at the university's Irvine campus. In addition, the department attempts to offer most degree requirements in the evening, so that it would be possible to finish a B.A. through evenings-only study. Lastly, the department has experimented with Saturday offerings.

For the spring 2014 semester, we are offering both lower and upper division classes on Saturdays. Though these classes are likely to have small enrollments initially, we are hopeful that the university will allow us to keep them in the schedule. We expect that–like Irvine classes, which originally did not have sufficient enrollment–over time we will build a consistent following for Saturday classes. As the number of students at CSUF increases, while space remains constant, the only way to serve students effectively will be through offering more classes online and on Saturday.

2. Master of Arts Program

Before the last PPR, the M.A. program had proposed to increase the number of units required for the degree from 30 to 36. This was in keeping with the typical number of units required by other universities for a master's degree. The faculty approved this proposal. However, due to the ensuing financial crisis, the department withdrew the increase in units from consideration by the university.

Currently, though, the M.A. program is considering re-introducing the request to increase the number of units from 30 to 36. In addition the M.A. program is considering requiring some or all of these increased units to be from a quantitative class list, comprising the newly approved Psyc 515–Meta-analysis, 516–Structural Equation Modeling and other forthcoming classes.

3. Master of Science Program

The M.S. program has always met State of California Board of Behavioral Sciences requirements for programs training students to become licensed marriage and family therapists (MFT). Periodically, the legislature has passed laws requiring changes, which the program has modified its curriculum to implement. Recently, the State developed an educational plan for preparing students for a new national license–Licensed Professional Clinical Counselor (LPCC). To best serve our students, the M.S. program decided to meet the standards for both licenses. To do so, starting with the class entering in fall 2012, the M.S. degree increased from 50 units to 60 units. In addition, the required number of face-to-face clinical hours during internship and Fieldwork class increased from 225 to 280 hours. The department also added two new classes: Psyc 550–Group Psychotherapy and Psyc 594C–Fieldwork, which is offered during the summer, so that students can count all their internship hours toward licensure.

Finally, the department approved broadening the types of scholarly works that could be done as a master's thesis. In addition to the traditional empirical thesis, students can now do analyses of secondary data or a meta-analysis. More clinically-based thesis projects include program assessments, case studies in which published empirical research is applied to the treatment of an individual clinical case, or analyses of empirical evidence for certain treatment approaches.

B. Structure of the Degree Program

While introduced and developed throughout the curriculum, student learning outcomes will be mastered in specific courses. To develop their competence in the area of research, all majors must complete the sequence: Psyc 201–Statistics, Psyc 202–Research Methods, Psyc 300–

Computers, and two of the experimental psychology lecture classes (Psyc 302-306). The sequence culminates with an experimental psychology laboratory class (Psyc 302L-306L), in which students get hands-on experience applying the principles and methods learned in prior classes. Students must also achieve breadth of study by selecting classes from specified groups and through choosing 9 units of upper division psychology elective classes.

The department has determined that all Psychology majors will demonstrate mastery of SLO's 1, 4, 5 and 8 (see p. 2 for learning outcomes) in the Psyc 302L-Psyc 306L experimental laboratory group; all majors must complete one lab. Students will demonstrate mastery of SLO's 2, 3, 6 and 7 in Psyc 495–Fieldwork. (The department is still working out the specifics of how to integrate SLO 7 into Psyc 495.) The Psychology Department currently does not have a formal capstone class, however Psyc 495 in many ways functions as one: it must be completed by all majors during their senior year, and it involves application—through hands-on participation in a real-world setting—of principles learned in other classes.

The core classes for the M.A. program present students with a foundation for psychological research: Psyc 500, 510 and 520T. In addition, Psyc 599 offers students the opportunity to conduct research under the supervision of a mentor. Students take 9 to 12 units of content

classes at the 400-level, which gives their education breadth. (When the quantitative classes are approved by the university, this requirement will be amended to read "400- or 500-level.") Finally, the M.A. degree culminates with the capstone experience of a master's thesis in which students apply the learning they have achieved previously in the curriculum.

The curriculum of the M.S. program reflects its scientist-practitioner model. Students complete classes required for MFT and LPCC licensure, as well as classes (Psyc 510, 520T and 599) that prepare them for completing the master's thesis. Elective classes may be used to meet licensure requirements or to take further seminar (Psyc 520T) or statistics classes (e.g., Psyc 467–Multivariate Stats) if they plan to seek the doctorate.

Clinical courses build in a sequence. The first semester, students take Psyc 501, 545 and 547, which give them a theoretical and practical foundation of knowledge for being a practitioner. In their second semester, students take Psyc 548, 560 and 561, which give them methods for working with clients.

In their second year, all students complete a yearlong internship, during which they spend 15 to 20 hours per week conducting therapy at a mental health facility. In addition to being supervised by licensed professionals on site, students also take Psyc 594A and 594B–Fieldwork classes, in which they consult with professors about their cases and review video recordings of their sessions. The Psyc 594 sequence represents a capstone experience for their clinical education and training. It enables faculty to correct misunderstandings and to fill in gaps in students' knowledge. It also enables faculty to modify content of core classes to make sure they meet the needs of students.

In addition, all M.S. students complete a master's thesis. The thesis is the capstone experience for their empirical education, allowing them to implement the knowledge they have

gained from their research and statistics classes. The thesis experience also gives students intensive feedback on their writing.

C. Student Demand for Department Offerings

Demand for psychology classes remains very strong. (Please see Appendix I for a detailed accounting of enrollment and graduation rates for undergraduate majors and Appendix II for the same information for master's students.)

1. Enrollment

From 2005 to the present, the number of psychology majors has climbed from 1,425 to 2,143. The increase over the last three years has been particularly dramatic. In addition to serving a large number of majors, the department also attracts many students to its lower and upper division general education classes.

A relatively large percentage of students who apply to transfer to Psychology at CSUF actually enroll at CSUF. This has ranged from a high of 60% in 2008-2009 to a low of 43% in 2012-2013 (see Tables 1-A to 1-C). The number of bachelor's degrees awarded nearly doubled between 2003-2004 (263) and last year (506) (see Table 4-A).

2. Retention, Graduation Rates, and Time to Degree

Undergraduate. Table 3-A presents graduation rates for students entering CSUF as freshmen psychology majors. Generally, from 23% to 33% of freshman psychology majors switch to another major before graduation, while 21% to 33% graduate with a B.A. in psychology in six years or less. The number of freshmen remaining in the major and graduating has been steadily rising since 2001.

For upper division transfer students (Table 3-B), a much larger proportion stays with the major. Between 55% and 70% of transfer majors have completed a psychology B.A. within 6 years. In the most recent two years, only 12% of transfer students have graduated with degrees in other majors.

Clearly, upper division transfer students are more likely than incoming freshman to stick with the major and to complete a psychology degree. In addition, less than two-thirds of students are completing their bachelor's degree within 6 years after admission. In recent years, some of

the slow pace of graduation may have been due to reduced course offerings caused by budget cuts. Other factors may include the typical CSUF student's working 25 or more per week, in addition to attending school.

To enhance graduation rates, the Psychology Department has increasingly offered a wider array of required and elective classes. In addition, these classes are offered at a broader range of times. For example, in spring 2014, the department has 6 classes scheduled on Saturday. Their enrollments are not large, but the hope is that students who have a difficult time completing their degree during more typical hours will be able to complete their degree more quickly through Saturday classes. In addition, the department is increasingly offering more high-quality classes online, which also gives students more flexibility.

The other consideration is whether some students' delay in graduation or decision to change majors may be a result of "bottleneck" classes. In the more difficult economic times, the department was not able to offer enough Statistics and Research Methods classes to keep up with demand. Currently, however, supply seems sufficient.

Psyc 101–Introductory Psychology has recently been identified by the university as a bottleneck class, because of the relatively low pass rate. The Psychology Department has maintained a longstanding commitment to resist grade inflation. We considered whether the grading in Psyc 101 might be unfairly harsh. This does not seem to be the case, though, when one examines correlations between GPAs for Psyc 101 and students' GPAs in other classes. For fall 2011, the following correlations were found:

Psyc 101 grades were strongly correlated with students' GPA in same semester courses and their total campus GPA (r = .63 for continuing lower division students and r = .70 for first-time freshman). We also examined correlations of GPAs for individual instructors. Results suggested that certain faculty appeared to be more effective with first-time freshman than continuing students, or vice versa. But, there did not seem to be any faculty who were outliers in terms of GPA. Thus, lowering academic standards does not seem to be the appropriate way to address this bottleneck problem.

In spring 2014, the department received funding from the university to conduct an intervention with students in Psyc 101 who are at risk of not passing the class. We have hired a group of graduate assistants whose job will be to intervene with individuals in danger of not passing. First, we will identify particularly at-risk students, those who are on probation or are repeating Psyc 101, and we will intervene with them from the outset of the semester. In addition, Psyc 101 instructors will communicate with the intervention coordinator regarding those students who have weak performance on assignments early in the semester.

Interventions will take several forms. First, GAs will monitor attendance of at-risk students and work to motivate them to attend. Second, GAs will conduct study and review sessions. Third, GAs will give workshops on study skills to students. It is hoped that, through this individualized attention, the pass rates in Psyc 101 will rise without instructors' having to lower their standards.

Graduate. Psychology's two master's programs maintain highly competitive admissions. Over the past 8 years, the M.A. program has accepted an average of 26% of an average of 82 applicants. The M.S. program has accepted an average of 30% of an average of 68 applicants. Those students accepted are very likely to enter the program. The M.A. program enrolled an average of 77% of those accepted for an average first-year class of 15 students. The M.S. program enrolled an average of 86% of accepted applicants, for an average first-year class of 17 students. In 4 of the last 5 years, the M.S. program has enrolled 18 or 19 students; this shows growth from previous years. Enrollment in the M.A. program has been less consistent (see Tables 5-A-1 and 5-B-1). A goal for the M.A. program is to consistently enroll 18 or more students per year.

Tables 5-A-2 and 5-B-2 show mean GRE scores and GPAs for applicants admitted to the graduate programs. Scores for those admitted to both programs are nearly identical. In addition, these tables show that, even though the number of students admitted to the programs has grown, admissions standards have remained stringent. Thus, the graduate programs have grown without diminishing the quality of the students.

Table 5-B-3 breaks down the type of institution from which new M.S. students obtained their bachelor's degrees. Over the past ten years, the CSUF M.S. program has admitted about 75% of its incoming students from the State of California: 25% were CSUF undergrads; 11% were graduates of other CSU campuses; 30% graduated from a UC; and 10% graduated from a private college or university in California. A substantial percentage (24%) of M.S. entering students obtained their bachelor's degrees in another state or foreign country. Thus, the biggest feeder for the M.S. program is the UC system, followed by CSUF and out-of-state universities.

Tables 7-A-1 and 7-A-2 display graduation rates for the M.A. program: 7-A-1 uses university data, while 7-A-2 uses data generated by the department. Since fall 2003 an average of 64% of students enrolled in the M.A. program have graduated in 3 years or less. During the same time period, an average of 21% of entering M.A. students transferred to the M.S. program, were dismissed, or withdrew. Thus, the M.A. program has retained an average of 79% of its incoming students. Over the last 10 years, the number of M.A. degrees awarded has been variable, ranging from 6 to 16 per year, with a mean of 11 M.A. grads per year (see Table 8-A).

In general, time to degree for students in the M.S. program has been increasing. This may be partly due to increasingly more hours being required for internship. With the increase in overall units to 60, it is virtually impossible to complete the program in 2 years. Since fall 2003 an average of 64% of students have completed the degree in 3 years or less. During the same time period an average of 12% of admitted M.S. students transferred to the M.A. program, were dismissed or withdrew. Thus, the M.S. program has retained an average of 88% of entering students. Over the last 10 years, the number of M.S. degrees awarded has ranged from 7 to 17 per year, with a mean of 13 (see Table 8-A).

D. Enrollment Trends (FTES)

Psychology Department classes continue to evince growing appeal to CSUF students. This is true both of lower and upper division courses.

1. Undergraduate

Table 2-B presents enrollments by academic year. Although it dipped slightly during the worst of the budget problem years, total undergraduate enrollment increased by 29% from 2005-2006 (1398 FTES) to 2012-2013 (1954 FTES). Table 4-B displays the ethnic breakdown of psychology majors. The student body is quite diverse, with whites representing less than one third of majors. Particularly Hispanics are more widely represented than in the university overall. In addition, Psychology has a larger proportion of blacks than other majors do. Over time, the percentage of Hispanics appears to be growing (43.6% in 2012-2013), while the percentage of whites has fallen to 27.3%. The Psychology Department is committed to educating the diverse student body represented at CSUF.

2. Graduate

Both master's programs aim to admit 18 to 20 new students each year. Actual admissions depend on the quality of the applicant pool and the extent to which CSUF is a highly ranked program for the prospective student. In addition, some admitted students fail to enroll in the fall, and some enrolled students fail to complete the degree for various reasons that are independent of the program. Table 6 summarizes master's degree enrollments in terms of headcounts and AY FTES. (These figures do not count students who have completed classes and are working on their thesis, while registered in GS 700. Thus, these figures undercount the actual number of students in the graduate programs who are still pursuing their degree.)

Over the last 8 years, the M.A. program has averaged 31 students, for an AY FTES of 18.96. For this same period, the M.S. program has averaged 37 students, for an AY FTES of 29.76. The graduate programs are diverse ethnically, with 55% of students' being non-white over the last 6 years (see Table 8-B).

E. Planned Curricular Changes

First, in conjunction with dropping Psyc 461–Psychological Testing as a major requirement and adding another 300/400 level elective in its place, Psychology continues to broaden the curriculum by developing new upper division electives. We anticipate continuing to do so. These electives enable faculty to teach classes that align with their special knowledge and interests, and they allow students more variety in elective choices. Second, we are currently in the process of modifying the curriculum of Psyc 495–Fieldwork to include a career module, which will focus on resume and cover letter writing, as well as job-search and interviewing skills. As all majors must complete Psyc 495 during their senior year, we concluded we would best serve our students' job-seeking aspirations by incorporating practical assistance with aspects of finding a job into this class.

It is likely that the department will again approve increasing the number of units required for the M.A. to 36 (from 30). This will likely be accomplished through the addition of a quantitative elective requirement. So far, Psyc 515–Meta-analysis and Psyc 516–Structural Equation Modeling are the only two classes in the curriculum that would qualify. However,

considering the expertise of the faculty and the extent of student interest in advanced statistical methods, we anticipate adding further graduate level statistical methods to the curriculum.

Finally, as State of California licensing laws change, the M.S. program curriculum will evolve to keep current with those requirements.

III. Documentation of Student Academic Achievement and Assessment of Student Learning Outcomes

Undergraduate. The Psychology Department is relatively advanced in its assessment activities. We are currently in our third year of a 4-year assessment cycle. Each year 2 of our 8 learning outcomes are assessed by the Assessment Committee using rubrics applied to actual learning products (e.g., essays, exams, homework) from undergraduate psychology classes. These assignments are rated on the extent to which the learning outcome has been achieved by each student. (Please see Appendix III for the department's Plan for Documenting Academic Achievement. Appendix VI contains the Definition and Examples of Indicators of Quality and Measures of Productivity, as well as the department's reports of our assessment results from the last two academic years.)

We have linked our assessment activities with our curriculum review process. The department has a 5-year cycle for reviewing all courses. The review process dictates that courses must explicitly address student learning outcomes in their syllabi and assignments. In addition, feedback from the assessment cycle is used to modify the curriculum of courses in which the assessment occurs.

Graduate. In the M.S. program, assessment of student learning occurs formally after the first semester. Faculty for the three core M.S. classes rate students in five areas that are tied to one or more learning outcomes: oral communication/class participation, written communication, knowledge of subject, readiness for clinical work, and readiness for thesis work. These evaluations are used for making judgments about students' readiness to continue toward internship in their second year. Occasionally, the faculty decide that students are not prepared for internship and must wait until their third year to complete internship; this gives them an extra year to enhance their learning or to mature. On rare occasions, these evaluations may lead M.S. faculty to decide that students are not suited to becoming professional clinicians, and students will be asked to leave the program. All students receive formal evaluation letters in person from the M.S. coordinator at the beginning of their second semester; the student and the coordinator discuss strengths and weakness and what must be done to ensure continued progress through the program.

In the Fieldwork classes (Psyc 594A & B), faculty review video recordings of students' work with clients. This enables faculty to have direct assessment of students' abilities to implement several learning outcomes. In addition, faculty use student performance to alter the content of earlier classes to best prepare students for internship. For example, the same faculty member teaches Psyc 594B and Psyc 547. He uses observations of student performance in 594B to modify his 547 course content to prepare students for internship and to enhance their accomplishment of program learning outcomes.

Finally, students in both the M.A. and M.S. programs complete a master's thesis. The thesis allows thorough assessment of students' achievement of learning outcomes related to

research design, statistics and writing. In addition to the thesis chair, two committee members serve as reviewers of each thesis.

A. Student Learning

Based on the outcomes thus far of our ongoing assessment cycle, we believe that students are learning what the bachelor and master's programs are designed to teach them.

B. Assessment Strategies

Our assessment plan for the B.A. degree covers a 4-year interval. Each year, 2 learning outcomes are assessed. These outcomes are assessed by obtaining work products from courses in which those learning outcomes are to be mastered and having at least two members of the Assessment Committee independently evaluate them based on rubrics designed for each type of assignment (e.g., paper versus statistics assignment).

C. Change in Assessment

As the department is currently in the third year of its first 4-year cycle, assessment has been fluid. For each learning outcome assessed, new indicators of that outcome are devised. In addition, new rubrics are required that enable the department to assess learning outcomes objectively.

D. Modifications

One outcome of our assessment program was changing the prerequisites for certain research classes. In years past, students were allowed to take statistics and research methods concurrently, or research methods and an experimental lab. However, the department deemed that students who had not completed more basic classes did not learn adequately in the later classes. Course prerequisites were changed to prohibit concurrent enrollment in classes, instead requiring students to take classes in a sequence that maximizes their ability to learn.

Although not necessarily an outcome of assessment, but rather an outcome of our desire to maximize the effectiveness of our assessment, the department has begun considering adding a capstone class to the major curriculum. A capstone class required of all majors would enable the department to reinforce learning throughout the curriculum; to work toward generalizing the curriculum into real-world applications, including job-seeking; and to assess learning across the curriculum as a way of objectively determining how well the department enables students to meet the learning goals of the department. The challenge is how to add such a capstone class without increasing the number of units required for the major, and without sacrificing some other content area.

E. Use of Assessment Findings

The Assessment Committee and the Curriculum Committee work jointly to integrate findings from assessment of learning outcomes with the curriculum review and development process. As part of the department's curriculum review, existing and new courses are required to specify which learning outcomes students will master and how the assignments of the class will demonstrate such mastery.

F. Quality Indicators

The department uses actual work products from courses as indicators of quality. These include papers, statistical homework assignments, and exams. Thus far, the individual graduate programs have taken responsibility for assessing quality indicators. The primary indicator is the master's thesis. In addition, for the M.S. program, quality indicators include papers and exams in first semester classes and video recordings of therapy sessions and case conceptualizations in Fieldwork during their fourth semester. Finally, both undergraduate and graduate students have a strong track record of co-authoring conference presentations with faculty and of publishing research with them in journals as co-authors.

Further indicators of quality that the department would like to assess more formally are admission to doctoral programs and passing licensing exams. We also aim in the future to keep track of our students' employment as an indicator that the department's programs have prepared students for a career.

G. Assessment of Online Learning

It is now possible for psychology majors to complete more than 50% of the required classes for the degree online. We do not have any classes that are online only. All online classes were originally approved as face-to-face. The department maintains rigorous standards for online courses; we hold students to the same requirements as face-to-face versions of the same classes. In addition, the Department Personnel Committee has done classroom visitation reports of online classes for teaching evaluations. To date, the department has not yet specifically assessed online learning.

IV. Faculty

The Psychology Department at CSUF has a vibrant and productive faculty, who is committed to fulfilling the teacher-scholar model. (Please see Appendix IV for detail on composition of the faculty and Appendix VII for faculty curriculum vitae.)

A. Changes in Full-time FTEF

The department's FTEF allocation was 40.7 in 2005-2006. It rose slightly to around 42 for the next two years, then dropped to a low of 37.0 in 2009-2010. Since then the FTEF allocation has risen, sharply in the last two years; it now stands at 51.0. In terms of long-term planning for faculty, the unpredictability of the budget has led the department to be cautious about hiring too many tenure-track faculty members. There are distinct advantages in terms of flexibility that having part-time lecturers affords. Specifically, the faculty wanted to be sure to avoid layoffs in the most serious depths of the economic crisis.

Despite budget concerns, the department has remained committed to refreshing our tenure-track faculty. We have hired nine tenure track faculty members since the last PPR. Two of these left after one year at CSUF. The other seven remain on the faculty. (One of these individuals is a child clinical psychologist; we had been trying to hire a child clinical person for about 10 years, so we are very pleased to have this person join the faculty.) We also are pleased that our recent hiring has enhanced the diversity of the faculty: 50% of our recent 4 hires are minorities, and 7

of the last 9 hires are women. Currently two-thirds of the Psychology faculty is women. In addition, the department's chair-elect is a woman.

Despite our steady hiring, though, the department has basically broken even in terms of number of tenure track faculty, compared with the previous PPR. More than half of our current faculty were hired during the period covered by our last PPR. In addition, we had a large exodus of senior faculty through retirement and FERP during that time. During the period covered by the current PPR, junior faculty have progressed through the tenure and promotion process. In fact, those individuals who received tenure and promotion to associate professor in 2008-2009 are now applying for full professor.

The current breakdown of faculty ranks is: 4 untenured assistant professors, including 2 new hires in their first year; 12 tenured associate professors, several of whom have applied for promotion this year; 10 full professors; 2 individuals who will complete their FERPs in spring 2014; and 2 full-time lecturers. Because of the increasing seniority of the faculty, it is essential for the department to continue to refresh itself through new hiring. If the budget situation remains stable, it will be possible to pursue a greater number of new hires, raising the number of full-time faculty overall, and increasing the ratio of units taught by full-time faculty relative to lecturers.

B. Priorities for Additional Faculty Hires

The department has a goal of steadily hiring new tenure-track faculty. This hiring will make up for faculty lost to retirement and will balance the age distribution of the department. The university has approved a search for the 2014-2015 academic year. The department has yet to determine the area of the search.

There are impediments to continued hiring, however, in terms of space. The Psychology Department has remained committed to assigning every tenure-track faculty member his or her own office and his or her own laboratory space. Due to a space crunch in the Humanities Building, however, the space allotted to the department will soon be used up. Thus, continued enhancement of the tenure-track faculty will depend on obtaining sufficient space to enable these faculty to be effective and productive teachers and scholars.

C. Roles of Part-time Faculty and Student Assistants

Part-time faculty. Part-time faculty play a very important role in teaching psychology classes at CSUF. Currently, 61% of units are taught by non-tenure-track faculty. Both in terms

of absolute numbers of instructors and in terms of units taught, part-time faculty exceed tenure-track faculty. During the most serious depths of the economic hardship, our part-time faculty pool shrank to 18 individuals during the 2009-2010 academic year, and lecturers taught only 32% of units. However, in 2012-2013, the number of lecturers climbed to an average of 41 per semester, who taught 61% of units. In spring 2014, we have 53 lecturers on the faculty.

Lecturers teach at all levels of the curriculum. Psyc 110–Critical Thinking in Psychology and Psyc 300–Computer Applications in Psychology are two courses whose teaching tends to be dominated by lecturers. In recent years, the department has actively recruited and hired top graduates of our master's programs. Many of these students have been lecturers for a year or two before moving on to doctoral programs. Thus, teaching experience in the department after graduation is another way of enhancing CSUF's contribution to our graduates' success.

The department has a rigorous evaluation process for lecturers. For many years, it was more rigorous than the university required. Recently, university requirements have caught up with the department's. All lecturers on three-year contracts are required to submit a portfolio for review by the Department Personnel Committee and the chair in the third year of their contract. One-year contract lecturers are reviewed annually. Individuals in their sixth year of teaching (who will become eligible for a three-year contract upon rehiring) are required to submit a portfolio covering their entire six years of teaching at CSUF. Since receiving a three-year contract is tantamount to receiving tenure, these reviews are conducted quite carefully. Decisions about rehiring are made after careful consideration of these evaluations.

Student Assistants. Student assistants are not permitted to teach their own classes at CSUF. They may give a lecture or two during the semester, set up and supervise laboratory activities, and mark up exams and papers. However, they may not be in charge of a class without the instructor's being present. In addition, student assistants are prohibited from assigning grades to any assignment. We actively supervise our undergraduate and graduate course assistants through Psyc 496–Student-to-student Tutorial. This class gives training and supervision, in addition to the mentoring received from the instructor of the course to which student assistants are assigned.

D. Staff

The Psychology Department is fortunate to have a highly competent and stable staff. During the time covered by this review, the department has grown quite a bit in terms of student enrollment. In addition, university procedures have changed to shift work that was once done at the university level to departments. This has increased the workload of staff, but the number of staff positions has remained the same.

Psychology is perhaps the only department on campus that still has its own equipment technician–particularly as IT has become increasingly centralized on campus. Terry Jones was an indispensable member of the team that planned and carried out the logistics of the 6th floor renovation. He also keeps the department's equipment in faculty labs, computer lab classrooms and proprietary classrooms running. Terry received an Outstanding Staff Member award from the university in 2012.

The department has two ASA-II's who run the front office—Frances Sanchez and Amanda Carey. Frances also handles professional travel and book orders. Amanda is the department's web master, who updates department web pages. Our graduate secretary is Kay Karlson. She handles the paperwork for graduate admissions, keeps tabs on progress of graduate students, and processes contracts for GA's. Kay also processes M.S. graduates' paperwork for licensure application. In acknowledgment of the amount and complexity of the workload, her position was recently reclassified from ASA-II to ASC-I.

Sue Maddox is the department coordinator. As the size of the department has increased, in terms of number of students, classes and part-time faculty, the complexity of her work increases not additively but exponentially. Just finding rooms to house all psychology classes is a massive undertaking. Sue collaborates with the chair on course scheduling, taking the lead in scheduling part-time faculty; she processes contracts for all part-time faculty. Sue manages the budget, in consultation with the chair. It is not an overstatement to suggest that the department's work would grind to a halt without Sue's excellent management. In recognition of the complexity of the work, the university recently reclassified the department coordinator position from ASC-II to Administrative Analyst Specialist. Sue was given an Outstanding Staff Member award in 2010.

E. Personnel Review Process

The department is committed to enhancing the clarity and accuracy of its personnel standards and its review process for full- and part-time faculty. To help accomplish these goals, the department modified its student opinion questionnaire (SOQ) that students use to evaluate classes each semester. Several years ago, the Psychology Department participated in a pilot project, in which all SOQ's were completed online. Since that time, the department has maintained an all-online format. Initially, response rates were quite low. Response rates have risen, but they are still disappointing. The department is seeking to work with the university to modify the SOQ process to encourage more students to participate.

In addition, the department's Goals and Directions Committee made extensive revisions to the Department Personnel Standards (DPS), which were approved by the faculty. The revised DPS were submitted to the university's Faculty Personnel Committee (FPC), which requested major revisions. The department responded to these requests and was again directed to make further major revisions. The department viewed the changes mandated by the FPC as undermining the intent of the DPS revisions. (This state of affairs seems to be the rule of thumb for all departments at CSUF when it comes to revising DPS.) The department decided to withdraw the attempted revisions and to await institutional changes that would increase the likelihood that DPS revisions would be approved by the university.

V. Student Support and Advising

The department is committed to providing support to students through advisement and other activities, such as Peer Mentors and student clubs and organizations, such as Psi Chi and the Psychology Department Student Association. Psychology faculty members are well-represented as allies in campus organizations that support traditionally marginalized students: Safe Space, which supports LGBT students, and AB-540, which supports undocumented immigrant students. Finally, psychology faculty members actively include undergraduate and graduate students in their research programs, frequently giving students an opportunity to coauthor conference presentations and journal articles.

A. Advisement

1. Undergraduate

The Psychology Department considers its approach to undergraduate advisement to be a model for the university. For over 20 years, the department has had a dedicated advisement office (currently H-830J) that is staffed by faculty specially trained and personally motivated to provide accurate advisement to undergraduate majors and minors. Each faculty member spends 5 hours per week in the Advisement Office, in exchange for 3 units of assigned time. Currently, we have 3 faculty advisors. In addition, we have a half-time, 20-hour graduate assistant who runs the office, maintains the paperwork and advises students. We hire graduates from CSUF for this position. They have a 2-year appointment.

Some other departments divide advising among all faculty members. The Psychology Department does not see this model as working adequately for us. First, with the vast number of majors and minors, it would be a huge undertaking simply to assign students to advisors and keep track of each faculty member's advisees. Second, considering the Byzantine nature of the rules and requirements for graduation, having a dedicated core of individuals with specialized training and dedication reduces the likelihood of erroneous advisement. In addition, a certain level of interpersonal skills and empathy is required for advisors; we hire as advisors faculty who are particularly suited to guiding students' futures.

2. Graduate

The coordinator of each graduate program is primarily responsible for advising students. Graduate coordinators meet individually with all students during their first semester to develop study plans for the master's degree. Coordinators help students choose elective classes and find research mentors. Once master's students link up with a thesis advisor, that individual also guides the student's academic progress and is typically a very important resource for advice about careers.

At the beginning of the spring semester, the M.S. coordinator meets with each first-year student to go over his or her evaluation letter, giving feedback on the student's performance during the fall semester. The M.S. coordinator holds meetings during the spring semester to facilitate students' finding internship sites for their second-year fieldwork sequence. In addition, during the first semester in the program, the first-year class is divided into "mentor groups." These mentor groups are assigned to a faculty mentor who meets with them bi-weekly. The

objective of the mentor groups is to give students a supportive environment in which they can ask questions, discuss stressful experiences related to the grad program, and receive support.

Finally, the graduate secretary is an excellent source of support and advice for students. One of the strengths of our department is the very dedicated and knowledgeable graduate secretary.

B. Collaborative Research and Internships

Internships. All majors in psychology are required to complete an internship. These internship experiences can be quite varied: from clinical work in mental health settings, to industrial/organizational work in businesses, to research work in a variety of settings. Internships create an important link between the university and the surrounding community, giving students and the department an opportunity to engage in service. In addition, such real-world experience gives students the chance to develop job skills that will aid their careers after graduation.

The department continues to be committed to making the internship experience as rewarding and enriching as possible. In spring 2013, the internship coordinator worked with the University's Internship Office to improve the orientation experience for students. This included producing a video orientation that students could view online prior to starting their internship. In spring 2014, the internship coordinator will be working with the university's Career Center and the instructors for Psyc 495 to create a career module that will give students practical experience related to job seeking, such as writing resumes and cover letters and interviewing for jobs.

At the graduate level, all students in the M.S. program do a full-year internship for which they provide therapy at a community agency approximately 15 to 20 hours per week. Students tend to work predominately with poor and minority individuals, who are underserved by health care agencies. These services are a very important contribution by the university to the well-being of Orange County residents. Internships also afford students essential, intensive training in therapy methods with diverse clients with a range of mental health problems.

Collaborative Research. Most faculty members mentor undergrads or grad students in research through Psyc 498–Directed Empirical Research, Psyc 598–Thesis, and Psyc 599–Independent Graduate Research. Collaborative research provides mentoring opportunities for students that are not available through traditional classes. In addition, research provides both practical skills and necessary credentials for students seeking admission to master's and doctoral programs. During the last five years, enrollment in collaborative research classes has ranged from 208 to 267 students (m = 239), which accounted for a mean of 633 units.

CSUF participates in the prestigious Minority Access to Research Careers (MARC) scholars program. Over the last several years, Psychology students have represented a large proportion of the MARC scholars, who are funded by a grant from the National Institute of Health. The MARC program provides enhanced educational opportunities and enables close faculty mentorship of students. Since the last PPR, Psychology Department faculty have supervised 13 MARC scholars.

Currently, faculty members do not get credit for supervision of students through Psyc 498, 499, 598 and 599. The department plans to continue to consider ways of compensating faculty for supervision. In addition, the requirement for all master's students to complete a thesis places a limit on potential growth for the master's programs. Currently, the supervision of thesis projects is not equally distributed among faculty members. The department will continue to seek ways to make thesis supervision more equitable.

VI. Resources and Facilities

A. State Support (last 5 years)

Appendix V details department resources. The vast majority of the department budget is used to cover salaries of faculty and staff. Operating expenses (OE) represent a relatively small portion of the budget. OE has declined dramatically from a high of \$105,236 in 2006-2007. For 2012-1013, OE was \$58,199. The department has received increased funding for hiring graduate assistants to do teaching and advisement. From \$17,199 in 2006-2007, the GA budget rose to a high of \$33,250 in 2011-2012, before dropping to \$24,225 in 2012-2013.

B. Special Facilities/Equipment

The Psychology Department recently benefited from the extraordinarily generous support of the college and university in the form of the Humanities 6th floor renovation. This provided the department with up-to-date classroom and research facilities. In particular, the 6th floor includes an observation suite comprising a large, seminar-type room and three smaller rooms. These rooms have cameras that can be monitored and recorded in an observation room. The 6th floor also contains the department's vivarium. (Unfortunately, the vivarium is not yet functional due to construction flaws. We are hoping that this facility will be fixed this spring.)

The department has a computer classroom, which is in almost constant use. Future plans are to create an additional such facility, as more and more classes are being taught by means of computers. In addition, the department has two computer data collection facilities. However, these are not large enough to meet the demand by student and faculty researchers. The department has been seeking money to renovate and expand current facilities to make better use of space and equipment.

Finally, the Psychology Department hosts two research centers: Dr. Nancy Segal's Twin Studies Research Center and Dr. Michael Birnbaum's Decision Research Center.

C. Library Resources

The university library gives electronic access to professional journals through PsycInfo. In addition, the library provides very fast service through interlibrary loan for any book that it does not have a copy of. Consequently, the department does not maintain library resources in terms of books and journals.

The department does have a library of instructional videos. Although, these are becoming obsolete as classes are moving toward online presentation of videos in smart classrooms. The department does have a variety of advanced statistical software that is available to faculty.

VII. Long-term Plans

A. Long-term Plans

There are certain areas in which the Psychology Department would like to grow. These include expanded fundraising, greater external grant support for faculty research, and enhanced assessment of longer-term indicators of successfully educating students—such as job placement, admission to graduate programs, and attaining licensure. In general, the department would like to keep in better contact with alumni.

The department is in the midst of its first round of a 4-year assessment cycle. Results of assessments of learning outcomes will be used to modify the curriculum. In addition, the department plans to assess learning in the master's programs more formally.

B. Implementation of University's Mission and Goals

As a department strongly committed to its students' learning and to its faculty's productive scholarship, Psychology's long-term plans closely fit the objectives of the university's mission and goals.

- The department's commitment to hiring high quality instructors and to offering innovative and diverse learning experiences ensures the preeminence of learning. Faculty recruitment focuses on hiring excellent teachers, who also are able to incorporate students into their scholarship. We intend to continue steady tenure-track hiring.
- The B.A., M.A. and M.S. degrees offered by the Psychology Department are dedicated to providing the highest quality education possible. The faculty continually strive to enhance the efficacy of our degree programs.

- The department has hired individuals who are committed to scholarship and to incorporating students into their scholarly work. During the 2011-2012 and 2012-2013 academic years, the department has been able to move to a 3/4-4/3 course load for tenure-track faculty. This move has given all tenure-track faculty 3 units of course release each year with which to pursue scholarship. It is hoped that, if the budget remains stable, the department may be able to move to a 3/3 teaching load in 2014-2015.
- The Psychology Department actively collaborates with the college and other departments in collegial governance and committee work. Several faculty members collaborate with other CSUF faculty in their scholarship. And a large number of faculty collaborate with researchers at other institutions. Finally, most faculty work with students in their scholarly work, and many co-author conference presentations and publications with them.
- The Psychology Department actively pursues student success. In particular, offering
 courses at non-typical hours, like evenings and Saturdays, affords students more
 opportunities to graduate quickly. The Advisement Office in Psychology advises a very
 large number of majors and minors with great efficiency. Mentorship of student
 organizations, internship opportunities and research collaboration all enhance student
 learning opportunities.
- The Psychology Department has lagged in obtaining external support in the form of grants. Recently, Dr. Mindy Mechanic is PI on a nearly-\$1 million grant awarded by the National Institute of Justice. Faculty members actively seek external support, but they have not been as successful as would be desired. In addition, the Psychology Department lags other departments in fundraising and alumni relations. A future goal of the department is to improve its connection with alumni and to seek more support through fundraising.
- The Psychology Department actively partners with community agencies through its internships at the B.A. and M.S. levels. These connections enhance CSUF's relation with the community.
- The department is dedicated to working with the administration to strengthen the effectiveness of the university. In particular, the department seeks to improve the SOQ process, as the university moves to an all-online format. The department also endorses institutional changes in how department personnel standards are approved to overcome the current gridlock in this process. Psychology faculty are well-represented among the memberships of committees at the college and university levels. In addition, psychology faculty have taken the lead in promoting such innovations at the university as SafeSpace and the interdisciplinary Queer Studies minor.

C. Evidence and Analysis

The department is committed to objectively assessing learning in its classes and to applying the results of assessment to the curriculum development and review process. We are currently in the third year of a 4-year cycle of assessment. The department faculty actively discuss our learning outcomes and how they are fulfilled by the curriculum.

D. Long-term Budget Plan

Long-term budget planning has been impossible over the last several years, due to the unpredictability of budget cuts. If better budget times continue, the department will seek to continue hiring new tenure-track faculty (as long as office and lab space is available); to move toward a 3/3 course load for faculty (which would in part give credit to faculty for student supervision); and to promote faculty scholarship through funding for materials, payment of participants, and travel to conferences to present results of faculty work. The department also would like to add a staff position. In particular, Sue Maddox could use assistance with managing the budget, administering grants and other tasks.

2011-2012 Assessment Plan & Cycle 1 Review Results

Department of Psychology, CSU Fullerton

I. Introduction

Psychology is a science that has as its central theme the study of behavior. Psychology involves studying about how we interact with one another and our environment. Psychology is practical; it is concerned with improving the quality of life. In order to achieve these ends psychologists work in a broad range of research and applied settings. The psychology major is designed to provide each student with a comprehensive overview of the major fields of psychology, the methods used in psychological research, and the applications of psychological knowledge. The major is also designed to assist the student in selecting elective courses which can form a concentration in an area of each student's interest. These specialty areas might include clinical, social, developmental/child, industrial/organizational, learning/cognitive and biological psychology. The major provides a basis for careers in a variety of psychology related occupations including mental health agencies, hospitals, teaching, business and public organizations. The major also prepares students for graduate training in fields such as clinical psychology; marriage and family therapy; teaching; social work; law; business management, and public administration.

II. Student Learning Outcomes

All students majoring in Psychology shall achieve competence in the following domains:

- 1. Students can identify appropriate basic research methods to test hypotheses empirically.
- 2. Students can apply psychological theory to scientific questions and real-world problems.
- 3. Students can find and evaluate relevant literature.
- 4. Students can demonstrate proficient writing skills, including scientific writing in APA style.
- 5. Students can manage data and analyze data using appropriate statistical methods.
- 6. Students can analyze psychological research and theory in relation to their own personal development.
- 7. Students can identify how diversity impacts individual and social behavior.
- 8. Students can employ appropriate ethical principles in psychological settings.

How these are assessed is explained further in this and the attached documents.

III. Assessment Instruments

Each of the eight Student Learning Outcomes noted above will be assessed in specific ways as outlined in the document "Acting on Assessment." These vary based on the student learning outcomes content.

Results from assessment of the student learning outcomes are noted under VI below.

IV. Assessment Committee

The Psychology Department Chair will appoint a committee consisting of three or four tenure and/or tenure track full-time faculty on a yearly basis. Faculty may volunteer or be assigned to the committee. The committee will consist of a Chair and at least two additional faculty (to be negotiated amongst those on the committee).

V. Assessment Schedule

The Psychology Department assessment program will proceed in a four-year cycle, with two student learning outcomes reviewed each academic year. As results from the assessment program are completed on a yearly basis, information will be passed to the Curriculum Committee if changes are required in Pedagogy.

Problems/issues with assessment of outcomes will also be documented and passed to the Curriculum Committee to help make the assessment process more efficient the next time a cycle is up for review. For example, as of August, 2012, a Cycle 1 review has been made, and certain changes to course materials for assessment purposes will be requested prior to the next full review of Cycle 1 in 2016.

Below is the current schedule for assessing the student learning outcomes:

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Fall/Spring 2011/12 - Cycle 1, Student Learning Outcomes 4, 5
Fall/Spring 2012/13 - Cycle 2, Student Learning Outcomes 1, 2
Fall/Spring 2013/14 - Cycle 3, Student Learning Outcomes 3, 7
Fall/Spring 2014/15 - Cycle 4, Student Learning Outcomes 6, 8
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VI. Assessment Results of Cycle 1 (including Method)

Cycle 1 consists of the following student learning outcomes:

- 4. Students can demonstrate proficient writing skills, including scientific writing in APA style.
- 5. Students can manage data and analyze data using appropriate statistical methods.

The overall conclusion of the Cycle 1 assessment is that these student learning objectives have been met.

Assessment of #4 - Students can demonstrate proficient writing skills, including scientific writing in APA style.

Existing course assignments were used from a Psyc 305L course. Currently, we are unsure of parity across the Psyc 305L courses in terms of materials requested by faculty, so we chose a single instructor who retained a full written experiment with literature review as the main assessment material. For future Cycle 1 evaluations, parity should be insured across the 305L courses to help with assessment materials.

From the 305L course, the first 10 student papers (N = 10) were pulled for evaluation (in alpha order) from the Fall 2011 semester. The course materials were reviewed per the Writing Rubric as developed by the Assessment Committee (see Appendix 1).

Two members of the Assessment Committee reviewed the 10 papers using the Writing Rubric, and their

scores were averaged. Overall, only 3 of the 10 papers averaged under a score of 2.0 on the rubric (our base cutoff), thus producing a success rate of 70%.

The 70% rate was felt to be adequate for this student learning objective, and thus the objective is met.

Assessment of #5 - Students can manage data and analyze data using appropriate statistical methods.

Existing course assignments were used from a Psyc 300 course, and a Psyc 465 course. Psyc 300 is a course all undergraduates must take, while Psyc 465 is an elective. In retrospect, focusing on Psyc 300 only may be more appropriate since it is a mandatory course for undergraduates, while Psyc 465 is an elective. However, it may be argued that the undergraduates in Psyc 465 are excellent examples of training within our program.

Materials were taken from one Psyc 300 instructor, and one Psyc 465 instructor (both from Fall 2011). Both consisted of a single statistical assignment. In addition, exam results were assessed from Psyc 465. The first 10 students' papers/exams were retained (in alpha order) from these courses. Note that from 465, only 3 of the 10 retained were used for this assessment since they were undergraduates (the other 7 were graduate students). Therefore, for future Cycle 1 evaluations, Psyc 300 or equivalent courses should be considered the focus for review. If Psyc 465 is utilized as well, all undergraduates -- not just a sample of students in the course -- should be retained for evaluation).

The total N for Psyc 300 was 10, and for Psyc 465 was 3. Note the total of 13 students are all different undergraduates. The course materials were reviewed per the Statistics Rubric as developed by the Assessment Committee Developed (see Appendix 2).

Focusing on the Psyc 300 materials, two rater reviews were averaged across the rubric. Overall, 2 of the 10 assignments averaged under a score of 2.0 on the rubric (our base cutoff), thus producing a success rate of 80%.

Focusing on the Psyc 465 materials, two rater reviews were averaged across the rubric. Overall, all 3 of the qualifying undergraduates averaged 2.0 or higher, producing a success rate of 100%.

These success rates (80% and 100%) were felt to be adequate for this student learning objective, and thus the objective has been met.

2012-2013 Assessment Plan & Cycle 2 Review Results

Department of Psychology, CSU Fullerton

I. Introduction

Psychology is a science that has as its central theme the study of behavior. Psychology involves studying about how we interact with one another and our environment. Psychology is practical; it is concerned with improving the quality of life. In order to achieve these ends psychologists work in a broad range of research and applied settings. The psychology major is designed to provide each student with a comprehensive overview of the major fields of psychology, the methods used in psychological research, and the applications of psychological knowledge. The major is also designed to assist the student in selecting elective courses which can form a concentration in an area of each student's interest. These specialty areas might include clinical, social, developmental/child, industrial/organizational, learning/cognitive and biological psychology. The major provides a basis for careers in a variety of psychology related occupations including mental health agencies, hospitals, teaching, business and public organizations. The major also prepares students for graduate training in fields such as clinical psychology; marriage and family therapy; teaching; social work; law; business management, and public administration.

II. Student Learning Outcomes

All students majoring in Psychology shall achieve competence in the following domains:

- 9. Students can identify appropriate basic research methods to test hypotheses empirically.
- 10. Students can apply psychological theory to scientific questions and real-world problems.
- 11. Students can find and evaluate relevant literature.
- 12. Students can demonstrate proficient writing skills, including scientific writing in APA style.
- 13. Students can manage data and analyze data using appropriate statistical methods.
- 14. Students can analyze psychological research and theory in relation to their own personal development.
- 15. Students can identify how diversity impacts individual and social behavior.
- 16. Students can employ appropriate ethical principles in psychological settings.

How these are assessed is explained further in this and the attached documents.

III. Assessment Instruments

Each of the eight Student Learning Outcomes noted above will be assessed in specific ways as outlined in the document "Acting on Assessment." These vary based on the student learning outcomes content.

Results from assessment of the student learning outcomes are noted under VI below.

IV. Assessment Committee

The Psychology Department Chair will appoint a committee consisting of three or four tenure and/or tenure track full-time faculty on a yearly basis. Faculty may volunteer or be assigned to the committee. The committee will consist of a Chair and at least two additional faculty (to be negotiated amongst those on the committee).

V. Assessment Schedule

The Psychology Department assessment program will proceed in a four-year cycle, with two student learning outcomes reviewed each academic year. As results from the assessment program are completed on a yearly basis, information will be passed to the Curriculum Committee if changes are required in Pedagogy.

Problems/issues with assessment of outcomes will also be documented and passed to the Curriculum Committee to help make the assessment process more efficient the next time a cycle is up for review. For example, as of August, 2012, a Cycle 1 review has been made, and certain changes to course materials for assessment purposes will be requested prior to the next full review of Cycle 1 in 2016.

Below is the current schedule for assessing the student learning outcomes:

Fall/Spring 2012/13 - Cycle 2, Student Learning Outcomes 1, 2
Fall/Spring 2013/14 - Cycle 3, Student Learning Outcomes 3, 7
Fall/Spring 2014/15 - Cycle 4, Student Learning Outcomes 6, 8
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VI. Assessment Results of Cycle 2 (including Method)

Cycle 2 consists of the following student learning outcomes:

- 1. Students can identify appropriate basic research methods to test hypotheses empirically.
- 2. Students can apply psychological theory to scientific questions and real-world problems.

The overall conclusion of the Cycle 2 assessment is that these student learning objectives have been met.

Assessment of #1 - Students can identify appropriate basic research methods to test hypotheses empirically.

Existing course exams were used from a Psyc 202 course. Currently, we are unsure of parity across the Psyc 202 courses in terms of materials requested by faculty, so we chose a single instructor who retained an end of semester exam for assessment. For future Cycle 2 evaluations, the Assessment Chair recommends continued use of an existing exam (such as reviewed here) -- this approach worked well and covered the objective adequately. Possibly an exam that better addresses hypotheses, however, should be retained.

From the 202 course, a random selection of student exams (N = 10) was obtained from the Spring 2013 semester. Course materials were reviewed per the Method Rubric as developed by the Assessment Committee (see Appendix 1).

The overall exam score was used to assess the rubric. The rubric was devised first, followed by access to materials for review. The overall exam score was used to assess the rubric, and fit well with the typical grading percentages -- 90% (a "4" on the rubric), 80% (a "3" on the rubric), and 65% cutoffs (a "2" on the rubric) for at least adequate performance. Percentages below 65% represented a "1" on the rubric. Because the overall score on the exam was fit to the rubric, no direct Committee members reviewed the documents.

Overall, only 2 of the 10 exams received a ranking of "1" (an "ineffective" rubric rating, equating to an exam score below 65%). Therefore, 8 of the 10 exams received a rubric ranking of "2" or better (our base cutoff for success), thus producing a success rate of 80%.

The 80% rate was felt to be adequate for this student learning objective, and thus the objective is met.

Assessment of #2 - Students can apply psychological theory to scientific questions and real-world problems.

Existing course assignments were used from a Psyc 351 course (Social Psychology). Psyc 351 is a course both Psychology and non-Psychology majors can take, though the majority are Psychology Majors.

Materials were taken from one Psyc 351 instructor from Spring 2013, consisting of a single assignment applying Psychological Theory (e.g., Balance Theory by Heider) to solve an applied problem. Currently, we are unsure of parity across the Psyc 351 courses in terms of materials requested by faculty, so we chose a single instructor who retained an assignment appropriate for review. Ten student papers were retained from a pile of graded paper assignments not yet returned to students. The first 10 papers in the pile were those retained for evaluation. For future Cycle 2 evaluations, other Psyc 300 or even 400 level courses should be considered for review. In addition, consideration for an embedded assignment should be made that applies theory.

The course materials were reviewed per the Theory Rubric as developed by the Assessment Committee (see Appendix 2).

Focusing on the Psyc 351 materials, two rater reviews were averaged across the rubric. Across the 2 raters, the average rubric score (mean average) was 2.5. Across the two raters, only 1 of the 10 reviewed received a "1" (inadequate) rating. Regardless of which approach used (overall 'average' ratings or individual ratings), we deem the success rate well over the 70% cutoff for meeting the objective.

The success rate (90%) was felt to be adequate for this student learning objective, and thus the objective has been met.

Includes application (whether actual application or written as on an exam or in-class exercise) of an adequate basic research methodology to assess the hypotheses. This would be inclusive of adequate choice of an adequate basic research methodology, but suggested basic statistical or qualitative analysis strategy can be weak or underdeveloped.

1 INEFFECTIVE

Fails to demonstrate an adequate ability in identifying appropriate basic research methods to test provided hypotheses or those generated by the student. Includes ineffective and/or poor application (whether actual application or written as on an exam or in-class exercise) of a basic research methodology to assess the hypotheses. Reflects inadequate choice of an adequate basic research methodology, and poor choice or no mention of a basic statistical or qualitative analysis strategy to assess hypotheses.

Research Focus

The research in the **Legal Psychology Lab** is focused on social-cognitive factors influencing people's beliefs, memories and behaviors. The research is in three interrelated domains. In the **Deception** domain, the studies examine cognitive factors involved in deceiving others, and how those factors relate to the detection of lies. We also investigate the validity of verbal approaches to detect deception. In the **Eyewitness Memory** domain, the research examines forensically relevant factors affecting the accuracy of event memory and person recognition. In the **Interrogations and Confessions** domain, based on our findings on jurors' misconceptions of interrogations tactics and confession evidence, the current research investigates whether other safeguards at the trial level (e.g., judges' instructions) may protect against erroneous convictions. We also examine dispositional factors (e.g., cultural background) that may place some individuals at risk for false confessions.



Current Research Projects

Most of my research focuses on various facets of visual expertise. I am currently using a face database of normal, disguised, and emotional faces that I collected while at Brown University. We are using the database to study how people recognize faces that have been disguised in various ways, such as changing the hair or adding glasses. We have also looked at how familiarity affects people's ability to recognize subtle, genuine emotions. Finally, we are collecting data exploring the role of eyebrows in face recognition.

I am also interested in more general aspects of object recognition, for example, the role of surface properties in recognition. Contrast reversal (similar to photo negatives) can be used to measure how surface properties contribute to recognition performance. My current research uses contrast reversal to explore the effects of other factors, such as visual expertise and object familiarity, on the extent to which surface properties are used for recognition.
