
"Communicating Chemical Secrets & Expertise in the 17th c. Holy Roman Empire"





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Abstract: The emergence of chemistry as a university discipline emerged in the last quarter of the 17th century primarily through its association with schools of medicine (as *iatrochemistry*, that is, chemical medicine). Through an examination of correspondence from the first medical and 'scientific' society in the Holy Roman Empire, the *Academy of Curiosi*, my talk proposes that the circulation of chemical, iatrochemical, and alchemical secrets played a central role in the legitimation of chemistry and chemists by providing a venue for physicians to demonstrate knowledge, practical expertise, and to attempt consensus about hitherto curious chemical mysteries.
