Director's Editorial

REFLECTIONS

As I pen my final newsletter editorial, I find myself reflecting on the CSUF School of Nursing's journey over the last few years...

With its rich 45-year history of providing quality affordable nursing education to persons in Orange County, CSUF School of Nursing has flourished adapting to the changes in the healthcare environment, the academic climate, and university and state

mandates.

Our faculty have collaborated with community partners, such as city groups and coalitions to promote the profession and community health initiatives. Faculty have also worked with community colleges to create seamless pathways for students to achieve their goal of becoming a professional nurse. The Tri County Concurrent Enrollment Program (CEP) with RCC that launches this Fall is an example of such a pathway. The growth of the DNP (CSU Southern CA DNP Consortium of which CSUF is the administrative campus) is also an example of collaboration, working with CSULB and CSULA to provide accessible doctoral education. The innovative

evidence-based projects the DNP graduates have developed and employed in their respective workplaces have improved client care and changed practice.

Also, in Fall 2018 the first cohort of BSN-DNP students (SRNAs) were admitted. The graduate program faculty are revising curricula to ensure the current concentrations and course delivery methods are meeting the needs of the healthcare community. To enhance program growth and expand services into rural underserved areas Dr. Mielke and the Women's Health faculty established a partnership with a mountain community hospital.

The SON faculty over the last four years have procured over 4.5 million dollars in funding to fund the aforementioned expansion, to provide community/student education in the area of substance abuse and mental health (Dr. Quaye),

develop a standardized patient program for undergraduate students in the skills lab (Ms. Williams, Ms. Doyer, Dr. Fortes, and Dr. Jung), and create new resources (nurse coach) to assist students with life balance issues, academic issues such as writing and reading (funded through EMBRACE), and promote a more diverse inclusive environment through the addition of cultural humility education and the development of a SON Diversity Support Team (Dr. Miller).

The SON is in the process of developing its next five-year strategic plan which will continue to focus on community needs and best practice. The SON will continue to look to our amazing community partners, our community Advisory Board (CAB), and our professional organizations, in which many of our faculty serve in leadership roles, and accreditation/regulatory bodies (e.g. BRN, CCNE, ACME, COA, etc.) to inform and provide insight that will guide the SON into the next decade.

and passion on helping some of the youngest victims of human trafficking. "There are approximately 300,000 youth trafficked in the United States - and those are only the identified victims." Read more...



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


















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
